FIRST WORLD WAR CENTENARY

This edition of the Parish News marks the centenary of the start of the First World War on 4 August 1914.

It is very difficult for us, 100 years on, to understand how such momentous events would have been perceived at the time. In a world before mass media, the Lynn News and County Press or the Lynn Advertiser were probably the main local sources of information.

These journals tell of a war against Prussian militarism and sympathy with invaded, innocent Belgium, from where several refugees were housed locally. Horses were being requisitioned by the army, the stockpiling of provisions was recommended, and the Girls' High School fitted out as a hospital.

Cartoons of alleged German barbarism and appeals to men to join the army appeared alongside adverts for cure-all medicines and Warner's rust-proof corsets. There were stories of German plans to invade England by landing in Norfolk, but the overall impression was that the war would be over by Christmas.

Sadly, that optimism proved to be misplaced. In this edition, and over the next four years, the Parish News will be remembering local people who gave their lives in the First World War by publishing their names, and as much as possible of their stories, on the 100th anniversary of their death. The focus will be those named on local War Memorials, but if you know of family members or other local people who gave their lives, please contact me by e-mail at

The first "We Will Remember Them" appears on the next page. It tells the all too familiar tale of a young man cut down in the prime of life.

Those who survived the war endured great hardships, whether in the course of battle or from the appalling conditions in which they lived day by day. Over the next four years we will aim to recount some of their stories and those of their families. Again, please let me know if you have information or stories you would be willing to share.

WE WILL REMEMBER THEM

Private William Victor Chapman Died 23 August 1914

In the 1911 census William Chapman was a seventeen-year-old bricklayer living with his father William, mother Eliza and three others of his eight brothers and sisters. His father was a shepherd and they lived in a 'Cottage near the Smithy' Tower End.



Before the declaration of war, William had joined the 1st Battalion, Norfolk Regiment as a regular soldier. They were one of the first units to go to France and after the ship from Belfast to Le Havre, various railway journeys and long marches, they ended up at Mons, in western Belgium, on 22nd August.

The men were in good spirits as they prepared positions in the exceptionally hot weather. All they knew was that a German force was approaching. The 'force' turned out to be a complete Army and on Sunday 23rd, the first engagement of the war took place.

The Norfolks were defending the area of the railway station, just to the west of the Mons, where, later on that day, William was killed. He was buried, by the Germans, in Hautrage Military Cemetery, 15 kilometres west of Mons.

UPDATE ON THE NORTH RUNCTON WAR MEMORIAL

The restoration of the North Runcton War memorial should be complete by the time this magazine goes to press. The memorial was thoroughly cleaned before repairs and engraving took place.

Your War Memorial Committee has arranged for a Re-dedication service to take place in All Saints' church and at the memorial on Saturday 9th August 2014 at 2PM. The service will be conducted by Rev Riaz Mubarak, the new rector of the diocese. The Deputy Mayor & Mayoress, Cllr Colin & Mrs Manning will also be in attendance. Following the rededication service, refreshments will be served at the Village Meeting Place. Attendance at the service and reception will be by invitation only with priority given to North Runcton residents. These invitations will be delivered to your door prior to the event. A tear off slip will be attached to the invitation. Residents are asked to return the slip to any member of the committee or contact can be made by telephone or email, as we need to know the numbers attending for catering purposes.

At the memorial, a Remembrance Cross for each man named on the memorial will be placed by children and the youth of the parish. Young volunteers and/or their parents are requested to contact any member of the committee should they wish to take part. North Runcton Neighbourhood Plan Update - July 2014

Back in March I reported that we hoped to complete a draft Neighbourhood Plan for a further round of consultation in April. Best laid plans! Suffice to say, following comments from our planning advisors and the sheer amount of time it has taken us to review and rewrite policies – that timetable has slipped. We are in good company though – as the Borough has delayed a decision on the outline planning application for 1100 homes by Hopkins Homes at Constitution Hill until the autumn, and public consultation on their own 'Detailed Policies and Sites Plan' is now not proposed until this October.

Our revised timetable is that we will have a draft neighbourhood plan for community review and comment in September. We are provisionally proposing the third weekend of September for an exhibition at William Burt Centre in West Winch and the Village Meeting Place in North Runcton (to be confirmed).

Earlier in the year, with grant monies we received from the Community Development Foundation, and jointly funded by the Borough Council, we employed drainage engineers from the local IDB to help us prepare a 'Surface Water Management Strategy' (SWMS) for the entire neighbourhood plan area. The engineers reviewed some of the emerging development plans for the area and used these to predict what drainage infrastructure will be required in future to prevent problems. After recent flooding in West Winch again this summer, local residents know how important this future planning is. The SWMS has been distributed to the Borough, County, County Councillors and the developers and we will put it on the Parish websites. We hope it will ensure a sustainable approach to future planning in the parishes.

Lastly, a study is presently underway to look at the future of the Hardwick Roundabout. We have constantly voiced concerns about the impact of more traffic on this important intersection – and now a joint study is underway involving the County Council, Borough Council and the Highways Agency, with consultants Mott McDonald. MIDDLETON PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

A47: Following the accident in April we wrote again to the Highways Agency expressing our concerns about traffic speeds through the village. Their response indicated that the rate of personal injury incidents on this stretch of the road did not meet the threshold required for further action. However there is a formal review of speed limits along this stretch of the A47 being conducted during the summer and we are currently preparing a detailed submission for the Contractors. We are also co-ordinating activity with East Winch Parish Council which we hope will strengthen both our cases.

Playing Field: We were very pleased with the positive response we received to the outline plans at the Annual Parish Meeting. We are very grateful to the Village Hall Management Committee for agreeing to our proposals which will enable some equipment to be located at the front of the Hall in line with recommendations from the local Crime Prevention Officer. We are now working to prepare the necessary planning application and a detailed project plan. We aim to be in a position to submit the necessary grant application in the early autumn.

Christmas Production: We are delighted to announce we have arranged for a Christmas performance from the local Theatre group, the Lavender Hill Mob, which will be held in the Village Hall on the evening of 20th December. This unique award winning theatre group will provide cabaret style entertainment for all ages (from performers aged between 4 and 86!) whilst the audience can enjoy the performance along with drinks from the bar. Please put the date in your diary and look out for details of how to book tickets in the next magazine. Speed Warning Sign: We will shortly take delivery of a vehicle activated speed warning sign. We have agreed with County Highways a number of locations across the parish where it will be deployed, although we are required to change its location every 4 weeks.

Middleton at the 2014 Village Games by Trevor Rackstraw

I had previously considered offering myself for the badminton event at the Games. As someone in their sixties, I felt qualified for the senior event but wasn't impressed to discover that 'senior' meant sixteen or over!

My big opportunity came this June when I and two club members were in the process of locking up the Middleton Village Hall after our Monday evening club badminton session. A young lady accosted us in the doorway and said she was desperate. One of her players had suffered an injury and, at the eleventh hour, she was looking for a new pair to stand in for the games the following weekend. Would any of us be willing to save her bacon and represent the GLEAM team (Gayton, Leziate, Ashwicken, East Winch, Middleton). My big chance! I sounded suitably positive but I needed a partner. Fellow club member Jenny Gray, a resident in Ashwicken, agreed to give it a go.

To cut a long story short, we did creditably well. We finished third of nine teams, beating near neighbours West Winch in the 'needle match'. We were enjoying the competition until a leg injury forced me to drop out during game six (we already had a 4-1 win-lose ratio). After a bit of rule studying and hobbling around looking for someone to take my place, we unearthed Adam from Gayton who just happened to be one of the best young players in the area. He partnered Jenny to one win and one defeat in our final two games and maintained our third place finish.

My story reflects only the senior badminton event but the GLEAM team overall achieved a creditable fifth place that included wins in the senior Netball and Archery, and in the junior fivea-side football.

CAMPAIGN TO TACKLE DOG FOULING IN MIDDLETON

Complaints have been made about dog owners in Middleton taking their dogs for a walk and not clearing up after them. Dog poo carries harmful infections such as Toxocariasis which can cause eye disorders, dizziness, nausea, asthma and epileptic fits and is especially dangerous for children.

An educational campaign to combat this problem will start soon in a partnership approach with the Borough Council, Police and Parish Council working together. In addition, there are plans for Police Community Support Officers (PCSO's) to undertake patrols in a bid to crack down on persistent dog fouling. The PCSO's are able to issue fixed penalty notices which carry a fine of £75 to dog walkers who fail to pick up after their dog. They can also be used for those picking up and then throwing the bag of dog faeces in the vicinity as a littering offence.

SO PLEASE make sure you take a plastic bag and clear up after your dog. Nappy bags are ideal, cheap and sweet smelling. The bag can be put in one of the many dog poo bins dotted around the village, or you can put the bag in your black wheelie bin at home, ideally double bagged.

'DOG ETIQUETTE' IN NORTH RUNCTON

Complaints about unruly dogs and dog mess are a constant issue for North Runcton Parish Council – especially on the common, where there are issues for livestock health. In an effort to 'educate' some dog owners (who we are sure are a small minority), the Parish Council have published the following advice for 'dog etiquette':

- 1. Always take bags (preferably biodegradable ones) when taking your dog out and always clean up!
- 2. Use the dog bins or dispose of dog mess responsibly at home.
- 3. Always have your dog under control and if your dog is difficult to control under <u>any</u> circumstances keep it on a lead.
- 4. <u>Never</u> let your dog off the lead on the commons when stock are out.

More information will be available on the Parish website – including a plan showing where the main grazing commons are and where the dog bins are. This advice is aimed at anyone who walks dogs in North Runcton Parish – which also includes common land at Hardwick Narrows.

NEW ELECTORAL REGISTRATION SYSTEM STARTS

This year's annual registration exercise starts on 4th August and for the first time everyone will be responsible for their own registration. This is called Individual Electoral Registration (IER) and replaces the previous system which allowed one member of a household to register everyone who lived at their address.

All currently registered electors will have their name and address checked against government records. Those whose details are confirmed will automatically transfer to the IER register without having to do anything and will be notified. Anyone whose details cannot be confirmed will also be notified and asked to provide additional information in order to be registered under IER.

Households where nobody is currently registered will be sent a Household Enquiry Form (HEF). The purpose of this is to ask whether anyone in the house needs to register. If so they will then be sent an Invitation to Register (ITR). Their details will then also be checked against government records before they can be registered.

The Electoral Registration Officer would very much appreciate householders' co-operation in making the change to IER as smooth as possible by promptly responding to any form received. In the event that anyone in a household receives neither confirmation of automatic transfer to IER, a HEF nor an ITR, he/she will need to contact the Electoral Helpline on 01553 616773. This will particularly apply to young people approaching the age of 18 but could also apply to anyone who has joined a household but not yet registered.

They have been stalwarts of both Middleton church and the village. We will miss them for lots of reasons and the posts they have held over the years will be hard to fill. We are sad they are leaving us and have valued their friendship over the years, but wish them great happiness in their new home. They go with our love and prayers.

OVER THE GARDEN FENCE with Steve Donoclift

As the temperatures climb and the dry weather continues, often a mixture of heady scents and fantastic colours grace our gardens, so sit back and enjoy your hard work, but not for too long. Remember watering is important at this time of year, so water regularly, remember your hanging baskets and plants that grace sunny walls, pots and containers. Regular watering is better than once in a while drenching. Keep ponds topped up and bird baths full, use water saving methods, use washing up water, or bath water to water plants as well.

Grass cutting has finally stopped! I can remember back to 2013 when marking out running tracks at some of the school grounds we manage and the grass was parched and the soil was hard, this year the grass has been green and the soil so soft..... so different. Variety... that's what makes life interesting!!!!

This time of year it can be an invaluable job to keep seed heads or to broadcast the seed that you may want to come up next year, keep the weeds down by hoeing (for horse owners, keep the ragwort away. Pulling it is an arduous but necessary job. I have spent hours doing this when we kept horses). Back in the garden, cut back long overgrown lavender, do not cut back to the 'woody' part of the plant as lavender does not respond well to hard pruning.

Swifts have left our shores, to start their long migration back to Africa, but the sight of Swallows and House Martins on electric and phone wires are a sign that late summer/early autumn are upon us and indeed these beautiful little birds are thinking about moving South as well. I wish them well on their long journey and look forward to seeing them next Spring. Steve
